

REPOSITIONING NIGERIAN PORTS AS THE MARITIME HUB OF WEST AFRICA

igeria is strategically located geographically, it is situated at the very junction connecting the West and Central Africa Republics, making the nation a natural hub where cargoes for the other regions could arrive and further be redistributed to the other sections and Sub-regions.

It should be recalled that certain countries recently claimed to be in the lead towards being hub of the region. However, the place of logistics network in the determination of the hub of Maritime operations in the West African Sub-region cannot be over emphasized. The current Management of Nigerian Ports Authority (NPA) have really devoted a lot of efforts at encouraging a seamless and integrated transportation system.

In her efforts to encourage enhanced trade facilitation, the Management of the NPA assisted stakeholders and ports users to establish

Management encouraged the use of barges to move cargoes from Lagos Ports to terminals and bonded terminals within Lagos to ease the pressure on the roads.

In the same vein, NPA in synergy with the management of the Nigerian Railway Corporation encourages the reactivation and the reconnection the rail lines to the ports for easy lifting of cargoes meant for the hinterland in line with the global best practice towards decongesting ports and effective trade facilitation.

One of the cardinal programmes of the current NPA Management is the continuous upgrade of relevant infrastructure at the ports across the length and breadth of the nation.

Among the national factors that puts Nigeria at advantageous position for the hub of the subregion is the over 800 kilometers of coastline which makes the nation contiguous to the sea for easy traffic of ships.

Similarly, Nigeria alone has six (6) Port locations strategically distributed along the Southern axis of the nation, while all the ports are equipped with modern facilities not all the ports are busy, which gives room for more activities to further position the country to achieve her aims.

Also, about five (5) Deep Seaports are already in the process of increasing the country's Throughput and Turnaround time of cargo. These are Olokola, Badagry, Bakassi, Ibom and the Lekki Deep Seaports and the last two are most likely to be ready within the next two years.

One of the most attractive factors which makes Nigeria a major candidate as the hub, is the huge market buoyed up by a large population of enviable manpower, both skilled and unskilled almost in equal proportion.

The appropriate distribution of Inland Container Depot (ICD) at the geo-political zones of the country in order to allow for quick turnaround of vessels is an added advantage, this is to help businessmen to receive their cargoes at an ICD close to their markets.

Finally, only last month Nigeria demonstrated her strong resolve to be the hub of Maritime activities in the Sub-region when she successfully berthed the largest container vessel to ever visit the West African Sub-region at the Onne Port, Rivers State. This was an eloquent testimony to the fact that Nigeria is well positioned and prepared to assume the position of the hub of Maritime trade in the West African Sub-region.

his edition reports that, besides Nigeria being strategically located geographically for the position of Maritime hub of West Africa, the Federal Government through the Management of the Nigerian Ports Authority, is leaving no stone unturned in its systematic repositioning efforts to boost efficient port

operations and trade facilitation services.

Highlighted also is the call by the Honourable Minister of Transportation, Rt. Hon. Chibuike Rotimi Amaechi, at the 2020 World Maritime Day celebrations, for all Maritime Agencies and Stakeholders to join hands in the fight against financial crimes in the sector.

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

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he Honorable Minister of Transportation Rt. Hon. Chibuike Rotimi Amaechi has charged Maritime Stakeholders and the general public to put all hands on deck and explore all relevant laws in the country, in the fight against various forms of financial crimes presently being perpetrated by a few group in the sector, especially in the area of Secure Anchorage of the nation's waterways, in view of the pivotal role the sector plays in the growth and development of the nation's economy. No responsible sector, he stressed, would fold its arms and allow a few to benefit from the resources that are meant for the nation's use.

The Honorable Minister made these remarks in Lagos recently, at the opening ceremony of the 2020 World Maritime Day with the theme: "Sustainable Shipping For A Sustainable Planet: The Nigerian Dimension" organized by the Federal Ministry of Transportation.

According to Amaechi, the responsibility of taking the sector to the next level should not be borne by the Ministry alone, instead if this crisis amongst many others in the sector, is nipped in the bud swiftly, the nation and individuals doing business in the country would benefit in the area of reduction in the cost of Doing Business in the country arising from the illegal collection of tolls on our waterways.

The Honorable Minister of State for Transportation, Senator Gbemisola Saraki, while welcoming Stakeholders to the event, charged all to take full advantage of the unique opportunity to make meaningful contributions towards the growth of the Maritime sector. She recalled that the annual event is organized across the globe to finding a meaningful forum to discuss Shipping, Security and Protection of Marine Environment. Hence, this year's theme she said, is apt since it would give a window for raising awareness of the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and showcase the work of the International Maritime Organization (IMO) and Member States at achieving its targets.

Declaring the event open the Special Guest of Honour, who is, the Senior Special Assistant to the President on Sustainable Development Goals, Princess Adejoke Orelope-Adefulire, informed the gathering that the President Muhammadu Buhari led Administration, is willing to support the sector in view of its role in the socio economic growth of Nigeria. She stated that, "The Maritime sector generates revenue both on land and on sea, as Shipping and Port play crucial roles in boosting Maritime trade, providing opportunities for increased employment and wealth."

The Special Assistant stressed that with the 17 SDGs in place, Government was assured of putting an end to poverty, safeguarding of the planet and most importantly, making people enjoy peace and prosperity by the year 2030.

The Chief Host at the occasion and Governor of Lagos State, His Excellency, Babajide Sanwo Olu, represented by his Deputy, Femi Hamzat, in his remarks, succinctly highlighted the critical role the sector plays in the life of a nation.

According to him, this year's theme could not have come at a better time than now, stating that the Lagos state Government was serious and has channelled available resources towards optimizing the full potentials of the sector through the collaboration with the Federal Government for the use of badges to facilitate its water transportation scheme for the transfer of goods within the state, in view of the congestion being faced in the nation's seaports.

The National Assembly through the Senate Committee on Maritime Transportation represented by Senator Tolu Odebiyi, who stood in for the Chairman, Senator Danjuma Goje, stated that the House was willing to formulate policies to facilitate the growth and development of the sector, stating that, the theme was apt in view of the crisis being faced by the sector arising from the coronavirus pandemic.

In a related development the House of Representatives Chairman on Maritime Safety, Education & Administration, Honourable Lynda Ikpeazu, charged all stakeholders on the need to redouble their efforts by investing in the security of the waterways.

Present also at the event were the Board Members of the Nigerian Ports Authority, led by its Chairman Chief Akin Ricketts, Chairman Ship Owners Forum, Margaret Orakwusi, President Association of Marine Engineers and Surveyors, Engineer Yinka Okunade and President, Women International Shipping & Trading Association (WISTA), Mrs Eunice Ezeoke amongst other dignitaries.

NIGERIA TO SUPPORT REGIONAL MARITIME DEVELOPMENT BANK

he Honourable Minister of Transportation, Rt. Hon. Chibuike Rotimi Amaechi has informed the Maritime stakeholders and the general public of the intention of the Federal Government at embarking on the Regional Maritime Development Bank project if two third of the Member States accept and agree to the decision reached by the Maritime Organisation of West And Central Africa (MOWCA).

The Honourable Minister made this disclosure during the opening of the meeting of Members of MOWCA Committee of experts on the Regional Maritime Development Bank Project And Interim Board of Directors held recently in Lagos.

Reports monitored and gathered by our In-House online newsletter crew, indicate that Member Countries of the MOWCA had identified the major deficits in the development of indigenous participation in the regional Maritime sector and associated value chain.

The Minister further disclosed that, discussions at the meeting centred on the need to establish a Maritime Bank which would focus on the growth and development in West and Central Africa with a view to raising debt and equity capital, as he said, "the Federal Government via the Federal Ministry of Transportation is mandated to take all necessary steps to bring the bank to actualisation."

He reiterated that, decision reached at the meeting centred on the need for swift collaboration and synergy amongst member nations for improved membership and realisation of the project in view of its benefits to all.

"Any decision reached at the end of the meeting would not be taken to Nigeria's President until other Member States indicate interest in working to be part of the project which would develop the Maritime sector in Africa."

"Whatever decision we reach here is subject to approval and confirmation of every Member State in writing. I will not take every decision reached here to the President until I have a buy in of 2/3 of the member organisation."

Maritime Stakeholders have applauded this development spear headed by the Authorities of the Nation's Maritime Agencies. They are of the view that with this development, there would be a positive development in the sector in Nigeria and the entirety of the African region.

Nigeria they opined would be placed in the vantage position of positioning herself in its rightful place in the world maritime sector .



APARTMENT SAFETY FOR RENTERS (TENANTS)

s a renter, your safety concerns are unique. You live in an apartment building or complex that is owned by a landlord or property manager. Naturally, you might assume that building security is taken care of. But when it comes to your own safety, don't.


