

HOW TO BECOME PROFESSIONAL IN THE WORKPLACE

ave a professional attitude: Be supportive of your boss and co-workers. Don't gossip about them behind their backs. Show that you are dedicated to the company by arriving at work promptly and staying until quitting time. Put in extra time when it is required without grumbling. Be respectful of your co-workers by not using their supplies or work areas without permission and by not taking up their time unnecessarily. Cheerfully give credit to others for their accomplishments.

Demonstrate professional maturity: Do your work with excellence? Accept responsibility for your mistakes. If you have made an error, don't shift the blame to anyone or anything else. Own up to the problem and offer to solve it. Learn to anticipate problems before they arise so that you can avoid them. Avoid petty interoffice bickering. Don't discuss your matters at the office. Instruct family and friends to not call or email you at work unless it is an emergency. Eliminate distractions, such as a radio, computer games or snacks on your desk.

Dress professionally. Choose modest, conservative clothing that reflects the more formal end of the attire accepted at your workplace. In an office setting, for example, casual attire may be acceptable, but a business suit or dress indicates that you are there to do business, not relax. Wear conservative dress shoes and walk with confidence. Upgrade a backpack, bag or large purse to a briefcase.

Manage your time and workspace professionally. Create a calendar on your desk or computer to note appointments and deadlines. Check the calendar regularly so that you stay on schedule with meetings and tasks. If you feel overwhelmed by the demands of phone and email messages, designate a specific time slot each morning and afternoon to review the messages and respond to them. Organize your work area so that you can readily find the files or materials that you need. Use space-saving and step-saving storage solutions to be more efficient.

Be a leader in your profession. Offer to make presentations, head up committees or become a liaison to a professional society. Stay current with changes in your profession through seminars and professional publications. Share the information you have learned with your co-workers. Take risks and demonstrate that you are a problem-solver by agreeing to take on difficult tasks.

Communicate professionally. Maintain eye contact and practice a solid handshake. Enunciate clearly. Listen attentively to others. Remain poised if others challenge your ideas. If you are uncomfortable speaking in public, join a Toastmasters chapter near you to gain practice.

Hostler (or hustler): A tractor, usually unlicensed, for moving containers within a yard. An employees who drives a tractor for the purpose of moving cargo within a container yard.

Interchange: Point of entry/exit for trucks delivering and picking up containerized cargo. Point where pickups and deposits of containers in storage area or yard are assigned.

I.L.A. - International Longshoremen's Association, which operates on the East and Gulf Coasts. See **labor unions** and **longshoremen**.

I.L.W.U.- International Longshore and Warehouse Union, which operates on the West Coast. See **labor unions** and **longshoremen**.

Intermodal Shipment: When more than one mode of transportation is used to ship cargo from origin to destination, it is called intermodal transportation. For example, boxes of hot sauce from Louisiana are stuffed into metal boxes called containers at the factory. That container is put onto a truck chassis (or a railroad flat car) and moved to a port. There the container is lifted off the vehicle and lifted onto a ship. At the receiving port, the process is reversed. Intermodal transportation uses few laborers and speeds up the delivery time.

IMX: This is transportation shorthand for intermodal exchange. In an IMX yard, containers can be lifted from truck chassis to rail intermodal cars or vice yersa.

ISO: International Organization for Standardization. Worldwide organization formed to promote development of standards to facilitate the international carriage and exchange of goods and services. Governs construction specifications for ISO containers.

REQUIREMENTS FOR A SHENGEN VISA

he Schengen visa is a short-stay visa which allows an individual to travel to any member of the Schengen area for a maximum of ninety (90) days per stay for tourism or business purposes.

The Schengen visa is the most common in Europe and it enables its holder to enter, or travel freely within and exit the Schengen zone from any Schengen member country.

Below is the process to apply for a Schengen visa:

- 1. Determine the visa type, Medical visa, Transit visa, Tourism visa or Transit visa.
- 2. Get the right link
- 3. Book an appointment some Schengen countries insist on online appointments, while others book appointments in person.
- 4. Complete the Schengen visa application form.
- 5. Gather the required documents:
 - a) The visa application
 - b) Valid passport
 - c) Two (2) identical passport photographs
 - d) Travel insurance policy
 - e) Round trip flight itinerary with dates & flight numbers specifically entry and exit from the Schengen area.
 - f) Bank statement of proof of financial means.

The other group is the visa-specific requirements, these documents and their specifications differ from one visa type to the other. In addition, some of the Schengen member states have additional requirements for visa applications.


- 6. Submit your application online print your copy and sign. In the case of a minor, the parents apply.
- 7. Pay the visa fee
- 8. Attend the visa interview.
- 9. Payslip
- 10. NPA Appointment Letter
- 11. Confirmation Letter
- 12. Promotion Letter

hen embarking on a Nigerian road trip there are certain things you need to understand and do to make your trip safer

and more enjoyable.

For instance, you need to pay attention to things like time, the use of tinted glass as well as speed but that's not all. Below are 12 tips you should keep in mind for your Nigerian road trip.

- 1. Pay Attention to Time: Schedule your journey between 9am to 4pm. Don't leave too early and strive to avoid driving during late hours.
- 2. Scroll through Your Phone Contacts: Remove titles from your phone contacts. Examples of such titles include Alhaji, Chief, Inspector and military ranks in general. In a sticky situation, you don't want rogues to find out that you are a dignitary or high-ranking member of a military parastatal. The lesser such people know about you, the better.
- 3. Keep an Eye on the Returning Lane: While driving, focus on the road and ensure that every 5-7 minutes, there is traffic on the returning lane. This helps you ensure that you are not driving into any kind of trouble ahead. In a situation where there is no traffic on the returning lane after 5-7 minutes, please, proceed with great caution.
- 4. Don't Exceed 100 Km/Hr: Try not to exceed 100 km per hour so you can make your timely judgements and driving decisions. It will also help you look out for dangerous situations and traps as well as help you appreciate the terrain.
- 5. Used Tinted Glass with Caution: If you can, please don't use tinted glass on your car. It passes a message to bandits and criminal elements that you are either an influential person or military personnel.
- 6. Do You Have the Necessary Tools? Ensure you always have a spare tyre, jack, plug and fuel pump in your car. Don't ignore this.
- 7. Keep Your Eyes on the Road: Even if you are not the one driving, put your phone away and keep your eyes on the road. Sometimes, the driver needs to be engaged to avoid drifting off, especially when tired.
- 8. Don't Stop at Random Points: If you must stop to buy a food article or ease yourself, it is advisable to take that break at a town, village or gas/petrol station. Avoid stopping randomly on deserted roads.
- 9. Don't Drive When Tired or



Fatigued: Avoid driving when you are sleepy, tired or in dire need of rest or sleep. These are not ideal driving conditions as you are likely to suffer a lapse in concentration.

- 10. Safety Tips Are Not Surprise-Proof: Generally, safety tips are great. They will help tremendously but cannot guarantee protection from unforeseen elements and circumstances.
- 11. Keep Your Phone Away: Avoid receiving calls or texting while you are behind the wheel. Ensure your eyes and concentration remain glued to the road and other road users around you.
- 12. You Need a Maintenance Check: Carry out a general maintenance check on your car before you put it on the road for a trip.
